
Welcome Our New Staff

The Carlino Family IBD Center medical and surgical faculty continues to expand with the addition of Dr. Patricio Lynn and Dr. Ron Panganiban, who will join the center in January 2024.

Patricio Lynn, MD – Colorectal Surgeon

Dr. Patricio Lynn is a fellowship-trained colorectal surgeon and assistant professor of surgery in the Division of Colon and Rectal Surgery. His expertise is in minimally invasive techniques, including laparoscopy and robotic surgery. Lynn treats patients with diseases and disorders of the rectum and colon. His interests include rectal cancer, bowel function after colorectal surgery and inflammatory bowel disease.

Ranked first in his class in medical school, Lynn trained at Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, New York, and has written book chapters on colorectal surgery. In addition to English, he speaks Spanish and Portuguese.



Ron Panganiban, MD, PhD – Physician-Scientist

Dr. Ron Panganiban will join our faculty and begin seeing patients in the IBD clinic in January 2024. A physician-scientist, he will provide clinical care, including endoscopy service.

Panganiban earned both his medical and doctorate degrees from Penn State College of Medicine, where he also completed his residency and fellowship. His research interests focus on how certain inflammatory diseases, such as pouchitis and recurrent Crohn's disease, occur after IBD surgery. In addition, he studies how dysfunction in some stem cell populations lead to development of IBD.

Discover New IBD Medications

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved several new medications for the treatment of moderate to severe ulcerative colitis (UC) and Crohn's Disease (CD).

Medication	Approved for CD?	Approved for UC?	Route of Administration	Notes
Omvoh Generic: mirkizumab	No	Yes	Three IV infusions every four weeks, then home injector pen every four weeks thereafter.	Available now.
Velsipity Generic: estrasimod	No	Yes	Once daily oral tablet.	Recently approved. Expected to be available now.
Entyvio SC Generic: vedolizumab	No	Yes	Two IV doses two weeks apart then four weeks later or week six start every-two-weeks subcutaneous injections.	Available now. Patients with UC on a stable IV regimen of Entyvio can be transitioned to the home injector pen.
Rinvoq Generic: upadacitinib	Yes	Yes	Oral daily tablet.	Available now.
Skyrizi Generic: risankizumab	Yes	No	Three IV infusions every four weeks, then home injector pen every eight weeks thereafter.	Available now.

Kono-S Helps Reduce Post-surgical Crohn's Disease Recurrence

Surgeons at the Carlino Family IBD Center are using Kono-S anastomosis, a unique method for reconnecting the intestine following surgery, that helps reduce postoperative recurrence of Crohn's disease.

Up to 75% of patients with Crohn's disease may require surgery to remove a portion of their small or large intestine. Unfortunately, 50% of those patients may develop recurrent symptoms, and some may require repeat surgery. Although medications can reduce this risk and are an important part of treatment for patients requiring surgery, the Kono-S anastomosis can help reduce the risk of recurrence and the need for surgery.

The name of the procedure comes from Dr. Toru Kono, who introduced the technique, and the "S" refers to a special part of the connection called the "supporting column." The technique can be used to connect all parts of the intestine. However, it is most commonly used to reconnect the small intestine to the large intestine or colon.

If you need surgery for Crohn's disease, ask your surgeon about the Kono-S anastomosis.


IBD Support Group 2024 Meetings
